YOUTH DEVELOPMENT IS A PROCESS THAT PREPARES A YOUNG PERSON TO MEET THE CHALLENGES OF ADOLESCENCE AND ADULTHOOD WITH RESILIENCE, ACHIEVE HIS OR HER FULL POTENTIAL, AND CONTRIBUTE TO SOCIETY IN MEANINGFUL WAYS THROUGHOUT THEIR LIFETIME. Participation in 4-H clubs provides opportunities for youth to learn and practice essential life skills that will serve them now and in the future, and experiences to expand life's possibilities. Participation in 4-H provides the building blocks for leadership! 4-H builds:

With its roots in agriculture, Onondaga County 4-H clubs now encompass a variety of experiences ranging from animal science to robotics, science and technology, sewing, cooking and healthy living...just to name a few. 4H EMPOWERS YOUTH TO DEVELOP SELF CONFIDENCE, MATURE IN SELF DISCIPLINE AND RESPONSIBILITY WITH A SENSE OF BELONGING, FEEL SAFE PHYSICALLY AND EMOTIONALLY WHILE ACTIVELY PARTICIPATING IN A GROUP, DEVELOP A SENSE OF MASTERY AND PRIDE IN SUCCESSFUL COMPLETION OF A PROJECT, WHILE WORKING WITH OTHERS TO PROVIDE SERVICE TO THEIR COMMUNITIES.

In 2019, 4-H clubs in Onondaga County participated in a variety of events, including STARR (State Teen Action Representative Retreat), Cornell University Career Exploration Conference, Public Speaking Event, Horse Bonanza, Syracuse Art on the Porches Arts Festival, Onondaga County Youth Fair and the New York State Fair. These community, county, regional and state-wide events provided youth a platform to proudly and confidently interact with the public, showcase their animals, demonstrate STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) and homestead projects, lead cooking demonstrations and share educational crafting activities with the public.

### AGRICULTURE

DID YOU KNOW -- Approximately 20 percent of the state's land area, or nearly 7 million acres, is farmland? Over two-thirds of Onondaga County's land area is actively farmed land, forests and open space, with over 150,000 acres in farms alone.

Farming is dependent on many resources, but a most critical one is farmland. Protecting farmland from development and keeping it as farmland is an important key goal of CCE Onondaga Agriculture. The avenue that is most used to protect this farmland is with conservation easements. A conservation easement is a voluntary legal agreement between a landowner and a land trust or government agency that permanently limits uses of the land in order to protect its conservation values.

New York State provides funding to farmland owners through its Farmland Protection Implementation Grant (FPIG) Program. This program places conservation easements on productive farmland, in perpetuity, to protect it from uses other than farmland. As of June 2019, THIS PROGRAM HAS HELPED PRESERVE MORE THAN 75,000 ACRES OF NEW YORK FARMLAND with millions of dollars awarded to these landowners.

CCE Agriculture provides key education regarding this NYS FPIG program through annual workshops for farmland owners that may be eligible and have a true desire to protect their valuable farmland resource. We cover different aspects of the program in these workshops, including the basics, site plans, land appraisals and tax implications. We also assist farmland owners with the complex application process

Agriculture is important to Onondaga County and **PROTECTING FARMLAND FROM DEVELOPMENT IS VITAL** to ensuring the growth of this industry. CCE Onondaga will continue to educate and support the preservation of our farmland for generations to come.



DID YOU KNOW -- About 40% of salt use in some areas of NY are from private users? In addition to being used on public roads, salt is also used on parking lots and internal roads of commercial and industrial establishments, schools, churches, apartment complexes, camp roads, or private driveways and drives.

Adding too much salt to an icy surface is an unnecessary cost and can increase damage to concrete, metal, drinking water, vegetation, fish and wildlife, as well as air and water quality -which can impact human health.

Private contractors, those who hire private contractors, and individuals who apply their own de-icing/anti-icing products have an OPPORTUNITY AND RESPONSIBILITY TO IMPLEMENT MORE SUSTAINABLE PRACTICES that reduce the negative environmental, health, and financial impacts of over application or rock salt.

On October 29th, CCE Onondaga helped run a **SNOW AND ICE CONTROL WORKSHOP**. The goal of the workshop was to increase the driving public's level of service while decreasing the amount of material put onto the road.

This workshop was conducted through a cooperative partnership between Central New York Planning & Development Board, Cornell Cooperative Extension of Onondaga County, Onondaga County Soil & Water Conservation District, New York State Department of Transportation Region 3, Central New York Stormwater Coalition, and Skaneateles Watershed Agricultural Program.

The highway departments can USE THE KNOWLEDGE THEY GAINED ON PROPER CALIBRATION TO CALIBRATE THEIR ENTIRE FLEET. There were a total of 77 highway department personnel in attendance from five counties and 21 municipalities. There were also three school districts, two private contractors, and one lake association. This training showed how to use the optimal amount of salt to both keep drivers safe and also be good stewards of the environment.

Proper equipment operation and calibration is essential for municipality cost savings as well as good for the environment. On-site equipment calibration was provided so trucks were prepared for this years winter.

CCE Onondaga is continually providing workshops to protect the beautiful waters of Skaneateles lake. Proper calibration of salt spreaders is one more aspect to **HELP PROTECT THIS WATER RESOURCE**.

### NATURAL RESOURCES



Since 2017, Nutritionists working with the SNAP Education Program have been working with the Liberty Partnership Program (LPP). The Liberty Partnership Program (LPP), is a collaborative project among the New York State Department of Education, Le Moyne College, and the Syracuse City School District. The Director of the LPP at LeMoyne College reached out to the Nutrition team in Onondaga County to provide nutrition and healthy lifestyle skill-based education programs as part of a broad range of support services for their health and wellness component as part of a college and career readiness program.

The nutrition team has worked with OVER 100 HIGH SCHOOL AND MIDDLE SCHOOL STUDENTS from Henninger, Institute of Technology at Central, and Nottingham in the past three years. Most of these cULTURALLY AND ETHNICALLY DIVERSE students participating in the nutrition programs presented with New American status having recently resettled from Iraq, Somalia, Sudan, the Congo, Nepal, Bhutan, and Myanmar (formerly Burma).

National data indicate that LOW INCOME, MULTI ETHNIC, REFUGEE SCHOOL AGED CHILDREN ARE AT RISK FOR OBESITY. Limited understanding of, and access to healthy foods within city limits, contribute to obesity risk for low-income, multi-ethnic refugee school-aged  $\geq$  10 years old. The LPP teens gained both the **CONFIDENCE** AND COMPETENCE to purchase and prepare healthy food through engagement in Eat Healthy Be Active Community Workshop lessons as well as the confidence to share newly-gained knowledge and skills with others while engaging in parallel programming to develop leadership skills – a key focus of the LPP.

SNAP Education workshops included HANDS ON FOOD PREPARATION AND SKILL DEVELOPMENT to create balanced meals following the MyPlate principles; reading and understanding Nutrition Facts labels to make healthier food choices, and strategies to reduce the amounts of added sugar, salt and fat in their diets. The last workshop in the series enabled the teens to APPLY AND PRACTICE THE KNOWLEDGE THEY LEARNED. The students attended both a grocery store tour at Price Chopper and Downtown Syracuse Farmer's market where they learned skills on how to purchase locally grown fruits and vegetables on a budget, compare unit prices for best values, identify whole grain foods, and limit purchases to stay within defined budgets. Each student received a \$10 gift card to purchase healthy groceries of their choice, using the skills learned on the tour that day. Utilizing LPP funds, the youth prepared 3 different recipes at each of 3 workshops to enjoy among the group as a "family-style" lunch; many of the ingredients used in the recipe were unfamiliar to the youth. All the teens learned skills on how to read and follow a recipe, modify the recipe for larger groups, and to WORK EFFECTIVELY AS A TEAM. They also learned basic knife and food safety skills, as well as how to measure, chop, dice, mince and blend ingredients.

Several of the students participating in this program were able to facilitate these nutrition lessons with nutrition education at the NYS Fair were chosen to serve on the Syracuse City School District Student Food Council.

In October 2019, The Director at LPP LeMoyne was selected to present at the LPP State Annual Conference in Albany to discuss best practices for the Healthy Living Skills component of their program and the added value of SNAP Education.

### NUTRITION & HEALTH

DID YOU KNOW -- According to studies by Food and Nutrition Service (FNS), of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), children participating in SNAP-Ed nutrition education programs INCREASED THEIR DAILY FRUIT AND VEGETABLE CONSUMPTION AT HOME by a quarter- to a third-cup, and were more likely to choose low-fat or fat-free milk?
